

This chapter will help you understand the main types of Bible translations, giving you a clearer idea of what to look for and how to choose the one that's right for you.

GETTING STARTED

The Bible we read today was not originally written in English. The Old Testament was primarily written in Hebrew and Aramaic, while the New Testament was written in Greek. This means that every English Bible you hold is a translation of those ancient texts.

Translating is both a science and an art. The people who translate the Bible must decide how to handle the original words, phrases, and cultural ideas. Should they try to translate the words as literally as possible, or should they focus on conveying the meaning in a way that's easier for a modern reader to understand?

This is why there are so many different translations. They each take a slightly different approach to this task, which in turn affects how the Bible reads and feels to us. Understanding these differences is key to choosing a Bible that's right for you.

We can generally group Bible translations into three main groups:

Word-for-Word Bibles aim to be as close as possible to the original language. They are often called "literal" translations.

Thought-for-Thought Bibles prioritise clarity and meaning over a literal rendering. They are sometimes called "dynamic" translations.

Paraphrase Bibles focus on re-expressing the Bible's message in modern, conversational language, sometimes taking more creative liberties with the text.



This approach, often called **formal equivalence** or **literal translation**, aims to be as faithful as possible to the words and structure of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek texts. The goal is to show you exactly what the original authors wrote, phrase for phrase, and even word for word where possible. This method prioritises consistency, often translating the same original word with the same English word to help you notice important repetitions and concepts throughout the Bible.

The primary goal of this translation method is not just to convey the meaning, but to bring you as close as possible to the world, thought patterns, and grammar of the original text. For those who want to dig deeper into the Scriptures, this approach is invaluable.

Pros:

- Accuracy for Study: This approach is excellent for in-depth study, word studies, and technical accuracy. It gives you a transparent view of the original authors' language and structure.
- Consistency: By translating the same original word with the same English word, these Bibles help you identify key themes and repeated ideas throughout the text.





The goal is to convey the Bible's message in a way that feels natural and clear in modern English. Instead of preserving the original sentence structure, translators choose language and phrases that express the same idea and intent as the authors.

This method aims to overcome the cultural and linguistic barriers between the ancient world and today's reader. The result is a Bible that is easier to read and understand, as it brings the meaning of the original text to the reader in a familiar way.

Understanding Dyslexia-Friendly Features

Other Excellent Options for Accessibility

The "best" format depends entirely on your goal: rapid reference and comparative study, or deep, focused, undistracted reading.
